Course Description:

This course explores key economic challenges and developments in Latin America, analyzing both historical and contemporary issues. Topics will span from long-term structural factors—such as productivity growth and income inequality—to short-term dynamics, including inflation, stabilization, and financial crises.

The purpose of this course is to explain the combination of theoretical economic models and quantitative data to deepen students' understanding of the regions and some cases at the country level economic trajectory and current economic policies.

Course Objectives:

The objective of this class is to analyze and investigate Latin America regional economic performance at the aggregate level, as well as some selected countries' economic performances.

By the end of the course, you will be able to:

- 1. Explain the geographic and historical foundations of Latin America and how they have shaped the region's economic development.
- 2. Analyze the impact of colonialism and trade dependency on Latin America's long-term economic structure and development trajectory.
- 3. Examine the evolution of labor markets and industrialization in the post-independence period, and their role in shaping modern economic outcomes in the Latin America region.
- 4. Analyze major macroeconomic challenges in the region, including inflation, stabilization efforts, dollarization, and responses to financial crises.
- 5. Understand trends in income distribution, poverty, and inequality across Latin America using empirical data and economic models.
- 6. Interpret the effects of commodity booms, volatility, and external shocks on Latin American economies across different time periods.
- Conduct country-specific economic analyses of selected Latin American nations—Mexico, Argentina, Chile, and Brazil—using time series data to evaluate economic performance and policy outcomes.

Expectations of the Course

Students are expected to read chapters listed below, review PowerPoints, videos, and announcements through Canvas. Students are also expected to complete group homework, individual pop-up quizzes in class, exams and presentations. Students are encouraged to study designated material. Class participation and class attendance are encouraged. It implies that you participate actively in the class discussions.

Five In-class individuals short pop-up quizzes:

There will be **no** make-up for these pop-up quizzes. You need to download the app <u>Kahoot</u> in order to be able to take the short pop-up quizzes. Every two weeks, I will use Kahoot for a brief 5-10 questions related to the topic of the previous class. We are going to start the third week of class, approx. 5 in total of pop-up quizzes, and the average grade will be 10% of your total grade. I will drop the lowest grade.

Two Homework in groups: To encourage you to share ideas and study in groups, there will be two homework assignments. I'll divide the class into groups by tables. Each group will choose one member to compile your group's work into a SINGLE document and submit it through Canvas and list all the full names and Panther IDs of each group member. Homework will be due before class listed in the schedule.

Please don't upload photos of your homework and recommend that you use a program, such as CamScanner, to convert your document to a PDF.

The first homework will be questions based on the main textbook .The second homework will be questions from the main textbook and additional materials provided or upload into Canvas, including tables, data and charts. Each homework will be 10% of your grade,

One In-class Discussion by groups: I will assign assorted news or different short reports or briefing from The Economist or another sources by group. Each group will have a unique topic that will cover some current news about economics in Latin America and the discussion will center on the group analysis of the article and the goal is to present your findings in class. You should upload a summary of one paragraph that analyzes economic concepts in Latin America by group, list your additional sources. To help you improve your oral communication skills. I will assign 5-10 min per group to present. Also prepare questions for other groups. Tables, data and charts are more than welcome to help you present your point. All presentations will be one week before the final weeks. If you miss this presentation, there wont

be make-up. However, you can communicate with your group members and if you work before on preparation for this discussion, you can get a partial grade. Actively talking and thinking economics may be the most important element to further your economic intuition.

Exams: There will be 3 exams in total. The first exam will be 10% of your grade, midterm exam will be 20% of your grade, and final exam will be 30% of your grade. Exams will be 60% of your grade.

Midterm exam will be composed of both multiple choice and short essay questions. I don't give make-up work or extra credit. If you have an unavoidable conflict, please come see me as soon as possible. Midterm will be 20% of your total grade.

Final exam will be given on the official exam date during Finals week. No late assignments or quizzes will be accepted. Deadlines are strictly enforced. It's not cumulative. I don't give make-up work or extra credit. If you have an unavoidable conflict, please come see me as soon as possible. Final exam will be 30% of your total grade.
