ECO 2013 - Principles of Macroeconomics

In this course, students will learn the foundations of macroeconomics as the branch of economics concerned with how decision-making, in an environment of scarcity, maps onto the aggregate economy. Students will examine theories and evidence related the following core set of topics: national income determination, money, monetary and fiscal policy, macroeconomic conditions, international trade and the balance of payments, and economic growth and development.

Student learning outcomes:

- Students will recognize that all decisions happen in an environment of scarcity.
- Students will examine theories and evidence regarding how changes in aggregate measurements are related to economic performance.
- Students will recognize the relationships between the components of the national income accounts.
- Students will analyze theory and evidence regarding fiscal and monetary policies and how they affect the economy.
- Students will identify theories of long-term economic growth and examine evidence for those theories.

The course covers all macroeconomic principles, their functions, and interaction. It also covers governmental intervention in our aggregate economy. It discusses monetary and fiscal policies, the role of central banking, intermediaries, supply and demand, and the business cycle.

- The International Economy. Students will Examine and recognize the relevant benefits and costs of domestic and international economic policy choices, distinguishing arguments presented, and constructing alternative policy outcomes.

Expectations of the Course

This is an online course, which means most (if not all) of the coursework will be conducted online. Expectations for performance in an online course are the same for a traditional course. In fact, online courses require a degree of self-motivation, selfdiscipline, and technology skills which can make these courses more demanding for some students.

Assignments

Student Bio Activity:

This activity will be posted on the Discussion Forum, which can be accessed from the left-hand navigation menu.

During the first week of class, every student should create his/her own student bio (No longer than 500 words).

You are encouraged to include following in your bio: name, status (freshman/sophomore/junior/senior), your reason for taking this course, your expectation of this course, your experience with any aspect of online learning (do you love it? hate it? why?), career plans (it's OK to be unsure!), favorite hobby. You also have a choice of attaching your photo (optional but recommended).

Macroeconomic Topics: Essay and Discussion Assignments:

There will be a total of 1 essay assignment 6 Discussion Assignments.

The purpose of selecting particular topics is to create a learning environment and allow students to enhance their knowledge of the principles of macroeconomics. The topics are designed to enhance the student's knowledge by researching the topic, reading, and extrapolating the knowledge in writing and formatting it for grading purposes.

The purpose of the discussions is to simulate a typical classroom discussion, frame, and promote collaborative learning.

You're expected to complete the essay and discussions on your own.

You need to format your answers according to all the instructions (exactly) given below. Any violation will result in a point deduction.

Essay Directions: 300-350 words

- Do not repeat the questions in your submission; just provided responses.
- Provide three (3) references required when assignment requires.
- Late submissions will receive 50% of the grade.
- Use your own wording, by researching, taking notes, and writing your own understanding
- Must be independently researched.
- Must be completely free of grammatical, punctuation, and spelling errors.

- One point will be deducted for each violation.
- Late submissions will receive 50% of the grade if submitted within 24 hours of the deadline.
- Late essays will not be accepted once Exam 4 (the final exam) has been taken.

Essay-Specific Directions:

- Use Times New Roman, 12pt font, double-spaced, 1-inch margins.
- Must be submitted as a word document (doc, docx) -- Canvas will not accept other file types.

Discussion-Specific Directions:

- Each discussion forum is worth 4 points. You may earn 2 points for your response to the discussion question (250-300 words) and 2 points for commenting on one classmate's post (100) words.
- Use the rubric and the prompts to fashion the post
- After posting your original response, be sure to read the posts of other students and respond to at least one classmate. You must state and explain what you agree or disagree with the posting you are analyzing.
- To maximize your points, be sure to post giving others enough time to respond to your post.
- Pay attention to grammar and sentence mechanics and use proper netiquette.
- Late submissions will receive 50% (2 points) of the grade if submitted along with two replies to other students. Otherwise, make up discussions without replies to other students get only (1) point.
- Late discussion submissions will not be accepted after Exam 4 (the final exam) has been taken.

Assessments

There will be four exams (56 points total, 14 points each). All exams are fully online.

All exams consist of 50 multiple-choice questions. Each exam will be available for one day from 12:01 am to 11:30 pm, eastern time. Once you open an exam, you will have 75 minutes to complete and submit it.

Important: Although you will be allowed to begin your exam at any time before 11:30 pm, it will be automatically submitted by the system at 11:30 PM. To get the full 75 minutes for the exam, you must begin by 10:00 PM.

Exams are not cumulative. Students are to work alone; collaboration is not allowed. Questions will be randomized and taken from a pool. To successfully complete the exam on a timely basis, be familiar with the content. If you want to review your results, you must make an appointment with the professor. No exam results will be available online.

In order to mitigate any issues with your computer and online assessments, it is very important that you take the "Practice Quiz" from each computer you will be using to take your exams. It is your responsibility to make sure your computer meets the minimum hardware requirements.

Missed Exams Policy

A missed exam cannot be taken online anymore. Students must notify professor within 24 hours of the deadline. Students have the option of taking it proctored or receiving 50% of the grade. The 50% makeup for missed exam whether online or proctored does not applies to "Core Curriculum Exam."
